Tips to Keep Children Safe

- Teach the Touching Rule: "No one should touch your private parts except to keep you clean and healthy."
- Teach children that they have the right to say 'No' if someone breaks the Touching Rule, or makes them feel uncomfortable. Then go and tell a trusted adult.
- Create a family rule: Your children need to know that you want them to tell you if someone tries to inappropriately touch them.
- Be aware of your child's environment. How well do you know the people who spend time with your child.
- Know how to identify a possible predator. I) an adult more interested in relationships with children than adults. 2) a relative or friend who singles out one child for attention, gifts or spending time.
- Teach children which adults can help if a child is in danger.
- **Talk about kidnap prevention with your children.** Offenders use lures, tricks or physical force to abduct children. Older children and teens are more vulnerable to stranger abduction than young children.
- Teach the buddy system. Children should learn when it is safer to be with a friend or trusted adult than it is to be alone.
- Teach children to check with the adult in charge before changing plans or going anywhere even if they're going with a familiar adult.
- Children should know how to use the telephone and dial 911.
- Role-play with children.
- Use the "what if" game to help children think of how they would respond to situations such as: "What if the school bus doesn't arrive on time?" "What if a stranger asks you to help him find his lost puppy?"
- Describe real-life situations such as confronting a stranger while walking to school or getting separated from family or friends in crowds.
- Have children practice reactions to threatening situations. For instance, in the case of a potential abduction, children should learn to yell, "I need help! This person is trying to harm me!"
- Show children how to stay at least an arm's length away from strangers who approach them.
